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Austria's Health and Long-Term Care System – Background and Challenges

Demographic change: ageing population → rising demands	Increase of multimorbidity, intensity of care	Staff shortage nursing and (health) care professions	Social health insurance system with broad coverage and universal access
strong focus on hospital- based care	weak coordination between sectors; lack of orientation within the system	Shared responsibilities and regional disparities in access to care	Highly reliant on family caregivers

Austria's Health and Long-Term Care System – Structures and Developments

- Fragmentation between primary care, hospitals, long-term care, and social support
- LTC is separated from primary care; organized at the regional level; shared responsibility
- Mobile services: mobile and outpatient support and nursing services to enable care at home
 - long-standing tradition of home-based care
 - provided through mobile care teams/units, assistance with daily living activities, personal hygiene, medication support (and 24-hour care)
 - provided by different professions
- Efforts to strengthen primary care and to shift more services into the outpatient sector and community settings ("digital before outpatient before inpatient care"); e.g.:
 - Enhancing primary care
 - Piloting Community Nursing

Community Health Nursing VS. Community Nursing community-based VS. community-oriented care?

- imprecise use of terms;
- Differences in target group \rightarrow scope of service \rightarrow intervention radius
- Similarity: activity that is organized and takes place locally

community-based care

• Focus: centres providing direct health services to individuals within a community

• Approach: delivers care where people live, work or gather (home health visits, mobile care services etc);

- Synonyms: home care, mobile and outpatient services, mobile health units community care
- Goal: to improve access to healthcare

Community Nursing (pilotprojects) →

community-oriented care

- Focus: health promotion, prevention and community development
- Approach: with the community (needs, strategies etc)
- Goal: to empower communities and enhance overall well-being



Community Nursing in Austria – Pilot Projects 2022-2024

Community nurses as central contact persons in the community, promoting and preventing the health of individuals, families, and communities, e.g. through preventive home visits

- Pilot Projects from 2022-2024; funded by the European Union (NextGeneration EU)
 - 2025: Continuation of CN within the competence of the provinces with different approaches
- Registered nurses (DGKP), with at least two years of professional experience, offer local and lowthreshold support
- Target group:
 - older people living (not yet) in the need of care, informal caregivers
 - the community as a communal setting
- Aims:
 - Promote healthy ageing, health promotion and health literacy
 - Delaying/avoiding the need for care
 - Supporting family caregivers



Enhancing the role of community health nursing for universal health coverage (WHO)


Figure 1. Summary of community health nursing interventions in PHC systems



Task profile of community nurses


Adapted Public Health Intervention Wheel (PHIW)

3 levels

- 1. Individual
- 2. Groups / communities
- 3. System

5 wedges

- Survey and monitoring
- -Interventions, education and counselling
- -Advocacy and representation of interests
- -Coordination and networking
- -Social marketing





Evaluation Highlights (2022–2024)

KÄRNTEN University of Applied Sciences



Methods

- Mixed-methods design: qualitative & quantitative
- Formative & summative approach
- based on program theory and logic model

The evaluation was conducted by the university of applied sciences in Carinthia and IARA (Institute for Applied Research on Ageing)

Outcomes: target population

- 1 quality of life and well-being;
 1 self-help and self-care
 abilities
- 1 self reported health status of individuals, families, groups
- 1 stay in one's own home
- 1 loneliness
- I contacts with GP; 1 use of services such as home care, physiotherapy and speech therapy (short-term)

Outcomes: nurses

- 1 attractiveness of job
- 1 stay in nursing field
- further training required

Outlook and open questions

- Community Nursing remains a promising but not yet secured service in Austria
- Several provinces are developing follow-up structures and regional models (Eberle et al. 2025)
 - Uncertainty due to temporary funding and unclear long-term financing
- Economic concerns and limited municipal budgets pose barriers to continuation
- Evaluation recommendations are available (Pichler et al. 2024)
 - Sustainable expansion requires role clarity, long-term financing, and national coordination
 - Further efforts needed to define the role, responsibilities, and system integration of CN
